Patients can experience changes in function, cognition or

health after an acute illness or injury; acute rehabilitation programs are used to support regaining independence at the maximum level possible. This practice improvement project was designed to implement a structured discharge clinical pathway for the acute rehabilitation interdisciplinary team to provide discharge education and preparation in an organized manner. Clinical pathways are tools that provide evidence based delivery of care in an organized manner. The existing education and expected discharge preparation did not change but it was delivered in a structured way to help facilitate continuity, communication, and

better outcomes for the patients. Eighty-five patients received discharge education from caregivers using a clinical pathway. Seventeen patients impacted by the intervention responded to patient satisfaction surveys. Two specific discharge questions were compared for the mean scores pre- and post-intervention. The statistical analysis of the mean scores using a two sample t-test demonstrated a clinical significance with a greater mean patient satisfaction score post-intervention for both patient satisfaction questions. The mean for question one (Q1) increased from 93.75 to 97.5. The mean for question two (Q2) increased from 89.8 to 96.25. Patient satisfaction scores

increased from pre-intervention to post-intervention; implementation of the discharge clinical pathway can be related to improved patient satisfaction scores related to discharge. Limitations to the project included small sample size and short implementation period to gather data. The project results provide implications for future research with the implementation of more diagnosis specific clinical pathways.
